



Suggestion #1: Collaborate with other descendants

Two other descendants and I agreed to:

1) Document the sources we used.

This allows someone else to search for and find the same or similar information.

2) Share sources of information.

For example, someone writes to the Secretaries of State for documents relating to their family. Someone else is good at reading old handwriting. Another remembers stories about Brackettville.

3) While researching, take note of information that might be of use to someone else.


Given under my hand in near Ciego de Avila, Cuba the 24th day of March in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and two.








I shared this information with the Descendant so that he could do further research to determine if this was his relative.
